Very nice day today (although it could have been a little warmer!). The skies were clear, the wind was mild, and the seas were not too wild. We did do a little crashing into oncoming waves, but overall, a pretty comfortable ride.

We motored all the way, since what little wind we had was light and on the nose. We dropped anchor in about 12 feet of water in the north part of this 2-mile long bay, among amazingly contrasting rock formations, from sharp peaks to smooth mounds, with colors ranging from yellow to orange to white and grey. We heard from other cruisers that this bay was very unique in it's rock formations and color, and they were definitely accurate in their description.

There are several beaches and hiking trails here that we'll explore tomorrow and possibly the next day. The snorkeling is supposed to be great here, so tomorrow we'll find out if the water is warm enough to do so. Odds are not good, as most of the bays have had water temperatures in the mid to high 60's for the last few weeks. Pretty brisk!!

We spend four days here with great weather - sunny between 70 and 75 degrees each day - with light winds. Very pleasant.

It was hard to leave all our new friends at Puerto Escondido, but such is the life of a cruiser. We pulled away from the Singlar docks after topping off water and charging the batteries. We raised the sails after we got out of the harbor and sailed for a while, but then the wind died, and we motored the rest of the way.

We were rolling side-to-side most of the day, sometimes pretty severely, and once again, our engine died, just when we were about 300 yards from a big reef. Fortunately the wind had come up enough for us to make some headway under sail, so we were able to steer away from the reef. I switched to the auxiliary fuel tank and bled the line, and the engine started and ran fine. So, there must be something about severe side-to-side rolling that causes air to get in the line from the primary fuel tank. Further exploration is needed. After we got anchored, I switched back to the primary tank, and the engine ran fine until I shut it off after 20 minutes.

The anchorage here is a little roolly. Waves are sweeping around from the north-east, but it's not bad. We should be able to sleep just fine tonight.

There's one other boat in the anchorage with us tonight - Raven, with Scott & Cheryl on board. We met them in Puerto Escondido a few days ago.

We raised the sails as soon as we cleared the reef on the south end of the bay. We started with a reef in both the main and headsail, and were sailing along at about 7 knots with 20-knot winds. After about an hour the winds calmed somewhat, so we shook out the reefs and continued on. Then about an hour after that, the wind began to build, and over the next hour went as high as 32 knots (true). We continued to reef as the wind built, and then finally about 1/2 mile from our destination, we dropped all sail and motored in. With the wind between 25 and 30 knots and the seas as high as 8 feet with a short wave length, it was quite an exciting ride. Much more exciting than the First Mate was happy with.

But, we made it in to the little bay on the southwest corner of the island by mid-afternoon, safe and sound, dropped the hook and had lunch. It's very windy in the anchorage, but there are no waves, as the island blocks them from the North.

The wind is supposed to be higher tomorrow, and then calm down somewhat the next day, so we'll probably stay here two nights to wait out the weather.

Had a lively sail back across the channel from Isla Santa Catalina to the Baja penninsula. The wind was around 20 knots most of the way over, so we were able to maintain a boat speed of between 6 and 7.5 knots. The waves were coming at us on the beam, but presented no problem, as the wind was strong enough to keep the boat from rolling too much. She would just rise up over the crests and dip down in the valleys, all the while maintaining good trim and speed.

We chose to visit this bay, Ballena, because of the unique rock formations and a cave that you can explore by dinghy. We dropped anchor up in the north bight in about 19 feet of water over sand. Very picturesque and peaceful.

With the spinnaker up and 22 knots of wind, we hit a boat speed of 8.5 knots a few times. Felt like we were flying!! My calculations show that we averaged almost 7 knots for the trip. That's fantastic sailing!!

There's a lagoon here with an estuary that winds through the mangroves. Supposed to be many varieties of birds and sea life. It was too rough today for us to launch the dinghy and explore, but will hopefully do that tomorrow.

The winds are out of the north and cold. We retreated to the cabin before the sun went down. The wind is still at about 17 knots out of the north. We're comfortable enough where we're anchored, but it would be nice if the wind would calm down a little more.

This morning we put the dinghy in the water and went off to explore the estuary that winds through the mangroves on shore. We found the entrance, but as the tide was going out, we had to get out and pull the dinghy upstream against about a 5 knot current in about 2 feet of water. Once we got through the opening, there was a big lagoon, and off to in the northeast side of the lagoon was the entrance to the estuary. There were a lot of white egrets and pelicans and other sea birds in the mangrove trees. We came out the other end of the estuary on the other side of the spit we were anchored behind, and after once again "fording" the stream out that end into the bay, had a pretty wild dinghy ride back around the point, as the wind was up to about 18 knots, and the seas were about 4-5 feet and breaking! But, we made it home alive (Terri says that just proves I'm insane - like the Billy Joel song).

Had NNW winds of about 15 knots in the afternoon which made for a very pleasant sail the short distance over to a bay called the "Hook" at the south end of Isla San Francisco. We put the dink in the water and went exploring on shore. There was a trail that went to the ridge of the hills surrounding the Hook, so we hiked the ridge from one end to the other. Spectacular views!! Terri's log has some great pictures.

We anchored way up in the NW corner of the bay in about 16 feet of water over sand and sea grass. Very good protection from the NW wind and waves.

We had a wild ride from Isla San Francisco to Isla la Partida. The wind was stronger than forecast, and the waves were "angry". We should have known right away that we were in for a rough time when we put the sails up in the bay at San Francisco, and within about 30 seconds the boat speed was up to 7.5 knots!! When we cleared the bay, the full force of the wind and waves hit us. We spent the next 3 hours battling winds that were 25-35 knots and waves that were 8-9 feet and breaking. We would frequently surf down the front of a wave at almost 10 knots boat speed, and then be thrown sideways in the trough where the combination of the next wave and the 30-knot winds caused us to round up. We had to hand steer all the way, since the force of the waves was too much for the autopilot to handle. There are going to be some sore shoulder muscles tomorrow!!

At the end of the wild ride, we anchored in a great little bay called Ensenada Grande. There are three bights in the bay, and we anchored in the middle one in about 10 feet of lime-green water between spectacular cliffs. The bay is very protected from the weather. It's such a great place, we'll probably stay here a couple of days.

Comments

We motored the short distance down to Cardoncito. We explored a couple of bays along the way and went into Partida Cove, only to turn around and head back up to Cardoncito. We're glad we did, as the anchorage is very cozy and private. Terri spent hours watching the pelicans, trying to get just the right picture of them diving for dinner.

We had a little problem setting the anchor, however. We wanted to set a stern anchor to keep the bow pointed toward the opening to the bay so we'd be able to more comfortably ride the rollers that were coming in. The wind, however, was blowing from the shore, so when we set the primary anchor, before we could get the stern anchor out behind the boat, the boat had swung around. I took the stern anchor toward shore anyway, thinking that if we set it, we could swing the boat around. That didn't work, so we decided to back down on the primary anchor again. Just a moment too late we both thought about the fact that we might get the stern anchor line caught in the prop. At just that instant, sure enough, we did. It hard-stopped the engine and jammed the transmission. After calmly assessing the situation (yeah, right!!), it was clear there was no choice but to dive down and clear the mess off the prop. So I donned my snorkel, mask and fins, and jumped into the cold, slimy water. After 6 or 7 dives down, I was able to get the tangled mass off the prop. When we got it all sorted out, we gingerly started the engine and put it in gear. It worked, with nothing flying off or vibrating wildly!! We didn't try going forward, as we already had the primary anchor set, so we'll test that tomorrow.

We then set the stern anchor the right way, by using the dinghy to pull the stern of the boat toward the beach before dropping the stern anchor. Once it was all tightened down, we settled in to enjoy the rest of the day.

We raised sails while still in the bay and sailed out into 10-12 knot north wind. The wind stayed with us for about an hour, and then died. We fired up the engine and made a circle around Isla Coyote, a quaint little fishing community on a very small island.

Once we cleared the south end of Isla San Francisco, the wind picked back up, so we were under sail again. The wind gradually built to 17-22 knots out of the NE, and the waves built to between 6 and 8 feet. That proved to be too much for Terri's Mom. By the time we were 30 minutes away from our anchorage, she was tossing her cookies!! It seems "The Patch" didn't work as well as hoped.

We dropped anchor in about 13 feet of water off the white sand beach of the middle bight of Ensenada Grande. The bay was empty when we pulled in, but as soon as we got our anchor down, another boat came in and anchored beside us (about 100 feet away). Too crowded!!

We settled in for the afternoon and night. The wind abated, giving us a very calm anchorage.

We got the spinnaker all set up while we were still in the anchorage, as it looked like we had NW wind, which would be perfect for a spinnaker run down to Chacala. However, as soon as we got out from behind the point that protects the anchorage, we found that the true wind direction was SW, meaning we wouldn't be able to use our spinnaker. So, we set the main and genoa for a close reach, and sailed along at about 6 knots into about 15 knots of wind.

About half-way to Chacala, we made a left turn around a rock, and that put the wind on our stern quarter, so we were able to roll in the genoa and put up the spinnaker. The wind died down somewhat, so our speed over ground was about 5 knots as we headed for the anchorage at Chacala.

About 5 miles out, the wind died to the point where we decided to motor the rest of the way in. The island called Marieta West is really cool - lots of arches and caves, and a lot of different sea birds, including the infamous Blue-Footed Boobie.

We raised anchor about 1600 and headed for Punta de Mita with following winds of about 15 - 17 knots. Boat speed was between 6 and 7 knots. Very nice sail over.

We anchored in 22 feet of water over rock and sand and had dinner in the cockpit while the sun went down. Overall, a great day on the water.

Yesterday we took a nice tour of Yelapa with the kids. Walked up to the waterfall. They both bought some gifts and trinkets at some of the little stands along the way. We had lunch at a restaurant overlooking the anchorage. They got a good tour of a typical Mexican village.

Today we motored over from Yelapa. Ran out to see the pirate ship along the way - an old-style "Pirates of the Caribbean" type ship that gives tours out of PV. They come out into the bay, shoot off their cannons, stop to let their passengers play in the water, etc. They were coming out as we were heading over to Tomatlan, so we decided to take a closer look.

Very challenging to anchor in Tomatlan. You have to drop the hook in 70-80 feet of water, and back down toward the beach into less than 10 feet before you're set. Took us 4 times to get the anchor set. And then you have to set the stern anchor, which is almost on the beach by the time you get it done.

Beautiful place, however - well worth the effort. The kids had a blast here. There's a fresh-water creek that empties into the bay at the head of the beach. Using the current, Cassie and Terri treated it like a water slide into the bay.
